

CAMERA ON THE GROUND PHOTOGRAPHY

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BRIEF AS PER WEBSITE

This theme changes the perspective of the shot from what you would normally observe, to either a horizontal from the floor view OR an upwards/tilted shot. We usually experience the world as lines and shapes, organized in relationship to the ground or a surface that is horizontally level. If you get down on your knees and tilt the camera upwards while taking a shot, the resulting photo portrays a scene that appears unnaturally slanted up. IF the camera is kept horizontal, the foreground leading to the subject becomes an integral part of the shot leading lines, in-or-out of focus foreground and balancing this aspect is important. Photographers also use tilted angles as a way to control how negative space interacts with the subject. For example, imagine a shot upwards into a group of trees or buildings. Slanting the viewfinder upwards will alter how the edges of the frame shape the negative space and the way it flows around the organic form of the trees or the geometric lines of the buildings. Floor/ground surface CAN be present in the shot, but is not a prerequisite. Good balance in the highlights and shadows (therefore the lighting is very important). Post editing allowed. No AR.

PLEASE NOTE: a photograph taken of a camera on the ground, while clever and possibly quite creative, does not comply with this theme.

"Photographers are often looking for ways to help separate their work and make their images stand out. A great way to do this is to utilize a distinct camera angle. If you want to get a neat perspective, try shooting from a very low angle. In Jay P. Morgan's latest video for The Slanted Lens (link below), he discusses the different ways you can shoot low and what type of gear you might need.

Just because you want a low angle doesn't mean you need to literally set your camera on the ground.

When shooting a full-body portrait, for example, Morgan discusses the advantages of shooting below eye level. If you shoot down on a person, they can look unnatural and their legs appear shorter. On the other hand, if you shoot lower, you can accentuate a person's legs. Perspective is powerful.
